## Methodology for neighbourhood surveys, 1979-1985

For the individual neighbourhood surveys the approximate extent of the neighbourhoods was known from prior surveys of a larger area as described in Appendix I. A margin of around one Km. was allowed around the edge of the approximately mapped area and within the extended area a base map was prepared with all the occupied dwellings identified as in Appendix 1. To assist householders in interpreting the map, the name of the family then resident at each house was added. A (reduced scale) example of one of the early neighbourhood maps is attached (Tooperang, Fleurieu Peninsula).

Each occupied dwelling was allocated an ID number. Many of the neighbourhoods studied had less than 30 dwellings and in these cases a full count was attempted. In the few cases with over 30 inhabited dwellings a simple random sample was drawn (without replacement) A sample copy of a questionnaire (relevant pages only) is attached. In the later surveys, Question 17 on the attached schema was omitted.
